Computation of Damages for Loss of Liberty

In <u>Martinez v. Port Authority of New York and New Jersey</u>, 445 F.3d 158, 160-161 (2nd Cir. 2006),

the Second Circuit affirmed the lower court's ruling that $$160,\!000$ was reasonable compensation for

approximately 19 hours in custody, or \$8,421 per hour.

I was falsely arrested at approximately 11:00 AM on 1/28/2014 and finally released at approximately 4:00 PM on 12/19/2014: or a total of 325 full days at 24 hours per day, plus the few extra hours between 11:00 AM and 4:00 PM on 12/19/2014.

First, compute the number of hours in 325 days:

 $325 \text{ days x } 24 \text{ hours} = \frac{7,800 \text{ hours}}{2}$

Now, add 5 more hours between 11:00 AM and 4:00 PM on 12/19/2014:

7,800 + 5 = 7805 total hours

Now, compute reasonable compensation at the rate of \$8,421 per hour, per the Second Circuit's decision in Martinez *supra*:

7,805 hours @ \$8,421 per hour = \$65,725,905.00 USD (for loss of liberty alone) (sixty-five million, seven hundred twenty-five thousand, nine hundred five dollars even)
